ART SHOW TO BENEFIT FORT WORTH NATURE CENTER & REFUGE

Exhibition and sale features 44 local artists and their works reflecting the Texas natural environment

FORT WORTH, Texas – Oct. 30, 2014 – The Friends of the Fort Worth Nature Center & Refuge will host a benefit art exhibition and sale titled “Broadview: A Spectrum of Nature” beginning Nov. 7 and running through Nov. 23 at the Fort Worth Community Arts Center at 1300 Gendy St.

Forty-four local artists were juried into the show, which features the native flora, fauna and landscapes of North Central Texas. Proceeds from exhibition sales will benefit the Friends of the Fort Worth Nature Center & Refuge in its efforts to restore the historic Broadview overlook, which the Civilian Conservation Corps constructed in the 1930s.

“The ‘Broadview: A Spectrum of Nature’ art show represents the culmination of a tremendous year honoring the 50th anniversary of the Fort Worth Nature Center & Refuge,” said Rick Shepherd, Friends board member and immediate past president. “We hope that this will prove to be the inaugural event of an annual show, presenting even more art from our talented local artists.”
